





Learning to Use Regret

Roese's (Neal Roese, a professor of marketing at the Kellogg School of Management) work shows that regret is a powerful force in human life. Far from being negative, regret is actually recognized by human brains as a positive influence on future behaviour.

Learning to Use Regret

In a further study, Roese found that people ascribed great worth to regret. Students responded that regret helped them make future decisions more than other negative emotions. Regret scored the highest of all negative emotions in the five functions of emotion—to help in making sense of the world, avoid future behaviours, gain insight, achieve social harmony, and improve approach.






Mourning For What?

The word translated as mourn in Matthew 5:4 (Gr. $\pi \epsilon v \tau \eta \epsilon o$, pentheo) is the strongest word for mourning in the Greek New Testament.

The basic meaning of the word is, "to bewail, lament, mourn for"

In Jewish literature the word often means, "to engage in mourning for one who is dead, ordinarily with traditional rites, mourn over"


If we claim to be without sin, we deceive ourselves and the truth is not in us. 1 John 1:8
